#### **English Department**

### **Home Economics**

During the lockdown period I designed a BBQ sauce that is finger licking good, that is if you like BBQ sauces. It is good for both indoor and outdoor cooking..... Irish weather style!

I used it over chicken pieces and then baked the chicken in the oven at 180C for 45 mins, uncovered for the last 20 mins.

It keeps well too, (covered) in the fridge if you double the recipe. My measurements are using a breakfast cup as a measure, but anything like a rem-kin dish etc could be used too.

#### **BBQ Sauce**

Half cup vinegar, wine or cider or plain

Half cup water

One and half cups tomato ketchup

One and half cups honey

One tablespoon mustard powder

One tablespoon soy sauce

One tablespoon Worcester sauce or any brown sauce

2 teaspoons paprika ... Smoked paprika is good too, it gives a lovely smokey flavour

2 teaspoons salt

2 teaspoons black pepper

2 dashes of a hot pepper sauce. You will hardly taste this, but if you like a bit more of a zing and heat add a teaspoon of cayenne or chilli powder.

To add a citrus under note: add juice of an orange, lemon or lime. (or if you are stuck a tablesp of marmalade) Yum.

### **STEM – Science Department**

As a teacher, I initially found the opportunity to teach online a little daunting, but it quickly proceeded to become quite rewarding - for both my students and myself. I grew in confidence week after week by becoming more familiar with Microsoft Office365 and finding new online resources to share with students. I began by working with my whiteboard at home and uploading tutorial videos, and gradually I put more focus into Microsoft Teams - which is very much akin to a virtual classroom. Each of my classes operated through Teams, where I uploaded tutorial videos, homework assignments, notes and quizzes. I could also host live classes here, which allowed me to check in with students regarding their progress and this also enabled them to ask questions. Microsoft OneNote proved fantastic for my mathematics and science classes especially, as I could write out solutions to calculations in real-time. I believe that online learning has truly been embraced by both staff and students in Rosemont and we have all had the chance

#### **Reel Life Science**



We hope all our Rosemont families are staying safe and well and look forward to seeing everyone again soon in our beautiful school building. Wishing everyone a lovely summer.







## **ART**

## **Education for Life**


#### **Religion and Ethos**
