Geography

5th year Geography mini river field study

On May 11th, a sunny Wednesday, the 5th year Geography students and Ms



Doyle conducted a mini-field study. The objective of the study was to examine a river cross-section. To do this we needed a meter stick and a measuring tape. With this equipment we were able to measure the width and the depth of the water of the river in Fernhill. We used the data from this experiment to determine whether vertical erosion occurs at this location. The 5th years concluded from their findings that vertical erosion does occur here and that it has created a mini V-shaped valley. Next year we hope to conduct a more in-depth field study. STEM – Science Department

TY Science 2022

The TYs have been extremely busy throughout the year, particularly in Science! In our three science classes - Biology, Chemistry, and Physics - we have fuelled our passion for the world of science through collaboration, demonstrations, and investigations. We discovered that science revolves around curiosity, and that asking questions about our surroundings plays a monumental role in generating solutions for the great mysteries of our universe.

In Biology, we learned about the five kingdoms of life and the similarities they often share in terms of their growth and the way they function. We discussed genetics, and how certain traits are inherited, and showed our creativity by making 3D models of DNA structures! We also had a great time planting Silver Birch and Scots Pine trees behind our school.

In Chemistry, we were in our element when we learned about Marie Curie, who continues to be a shining star for women in science, long after her demise. We learned all about radioactivity and the three main types of radiation and their uses today. We enjoyed learning about the vital contribution of Chemistry to the development and growth of several industries. Periodically, we would explore some of the elements of the periodic table and what products they are used in.

Finally, in our Physics classes, we studied the various forms of energy, with a particular emphasis on nuclear energy. We analysed the difference between nuclear fission and nuclear fusion and considered the wide-ranging impacts of both. We touched on refraction, and how the cornea, in the human eye works to refract light onto the retina. The image is then sent to the brain. Without refraction, we wouldn't be able to see! Additionally, we were taught about static electricity and got a buzz out of lighting bulbs and buzzing buzzers and rubbing pens on our jumpers and watching pieces of paper stick to them!

All in all, TY Science has undoubtedly fed our fervor for science and has opened our eyes to the ever-expanding role of science in our day-to-day lives. We were provided with a valuable insight into to several prospective careers involving

the sciences, and now have a strong base and interest for each subject, should we wish to continue with any in fifth year. Indisputably, a great year!

In Transition Year we completed many fun activities in Chemistry, Physics/Applied Maths, and Biology class!

During Chemistry/Biology class all the Transition Year students got to plant trees, which were: Scots Pines and Silver Birch, on school grounds. In addition to this, we learned a lot about the trees that were planted. It was an overall enjoyable experience.

In Physics class both Transition Year Oak and Elm got to experience how the Van de Graaff generator works and how Static Electricity is produced. Static Electricity is produced by friction between two insulating objects! We got to witness the cake tins on the Van de Graaff experiment and how the cake tins repel off of the Van de Graaff dome.

In Transition Year Applied Maths we learned about Vectors and Scalars and the Parallelogram theorem! In doing so, we were able to construct diagrams of Vectors. We also learned how to find the magnitude and direction of the Vector using Pythagoras!

Senior Art Trip

Thursday 9th December 2021 was the day for our Senior Art Students Gallery Trip. All of us headed off into town on the Luas and travelled all the way to The Hugh Lane Gallery on Parnell Square. The Hugh Lane has an exceptional history centred around the ground-breaking vision of Sir Hugh Lane himself.



We had recently studied The Impressionist movement, so we were particularly keen to view the two Claude Monet paintings on view. We had a tour guide booked so at 11.15 we met our guide and off we went. The Hugh Lane features many great Irish artists and our guide brought us to view the large-scale Sean Scully paintings. Large bands of colour, layers of paint and simple forms are the key features of Scully's work. The girls were hugely impressed with this abstract artist. His paintings are based on childhood memories and working as a young man on the building sites in London.

The Gallery also boasts a collection of 6 unfinished paintings by Francis Bacon and his studio which was brought over from London piece by piece. His studio was an absolute mess however he claimed that it helped him paint and kept his mind busy. His work is world known and is found in the best Public Collections.

Next our guide brought us to the European section where Edgar Degas, Berthe Morisot and Claude Monet are all on

view. We were delighted to see Monet's work on the wall as we had studied his style, techniques, subject matter, and brushstrokes all of which are key features of the Impressionist movement. Our guide gave us a great insight into his techniques and composition. This really helped our overall understanding of this movement.

TYs had the opportunity to do a tour of Kilmainham Gaol. We were all well acquainted with the role this historic building played in imprisoning and executing fourteen of the leaders of the 1916 Rising but were astounded to discover there was more to the jail's extensive history and grim past.

After a walk in Bully's Acre, we began the tour with a visit to the chapel where Grace Gifford and Joseph Plunkett were married, the inspiration behind the beloved ballad, 'Grace'. Subsequently, we saw the dismal cells where Irish political prisoners were detained, including Countess Constance Markievicz, Charles Stewart Parnell, and Éamonn de Valera. The cold and miserable atmosphere gave us significant and accurate insight into what it would have been like to be confined in one of these strongholds of punishment!

We learned about the overcrowding that happened in the Gaol during the nineteenth century due to the Great Famine and heard stories of ordinary people of the past and their experiences in the Gaol. We roamed the West Wing (film place of Paddington 2!) before finishing the tour at the Stonebreaker's Yard outside.

All in all, the tour was fascinating and painted clear pictures of the profound struggles and inspirational events that shaped the history of our country.
